NYC to offer low-cost healthcare to uninsured immigrants

New York will become one of the first major U.S. cities to expand low-cost healthcare to uninsured immigrants regardless of their legal status under a pilot program to launch next spring. Mayor Bill de Blasio said last Thursday. According to Reuters, the pilot, called Direct Access, will initially apply to 1,000 immigrants. Some of them are in the country legally but still ineligible for support under the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, popularly known as Obamacare. Roxas, Robredo formalize '16 tandem

MANILA — Former Interior and Local Government Secretary Manuel “Mar” Roxas II and his running mate, Camarines Sur Rep. Maria Leonor “Leni” Robredo, on Thursday filed their certificates of candidacy for the 2016 national elections.

President Benigno Aquino III earlier endorsed Roxas as the standard-bearer of the ruling Liberal Party (LP) and will seek presidency.

Roxas, meanwhile, chose Camarines Sur Rep. Maria Leonor “Leni” Robredo as his running mate. Turn to page 14

58 Aklan mothers die in 100,000 live births

KALIBO, Aklan — Data from the Department of Health (DOH) shows Aklan ranked third with

the highest maternal mortality rate among the six provinces in the region.

Aklan had an average of 58.48

maternal deaths per 100,000 live births, lower than the average of 90 per 100,000 live births in Western Visayas.

Pregnancy and childbirth are among the leading causes of death, disease and disability in women of reproductive age in

developing countries.

Maternal deaths or mothers dying during child birth are common. Turn to page 10
